Christ Episcopal Church Outreach Commission Guidelines

Financial grants from the Outreach Commission of Christ Episcopal Church are made in response to the call of Jesus to share all we have and to be good stewards of the gifts we have been given. We work to keep our Baptismal promises "to seek and serve Christ in all persons, loving our neighbors as ourselves" and "to strive for justice and peace among all people and respect the dignity of every human being." Accordingly, the following guidelines have been established as ideal, not absolute, criteria to help us focus our ministries in the community.

- The Outreach Commission will support organizations associated with the following pillars:
 - Housing Stability & Solutions to Homelessness
 - Reconciliation & Restorative Social Justice
 - Economic Opportunity and Stabilization
 - Children, Youth, & Educational Equity
 - Care and Sustainment of God's Creation
- Each organization we support should provide an opportunity for Christ Church parishioners to volunteer.
- The Outreach gift to the organization should not exceed 10% of the organization's overall budget.
- The Outreach gift to the organization should not exceed 10% of the Christ Church total outreach budget unless it is a core church initiative with strong parishioner involvement.
- The organization should allocate at least 80% of its total budget to programming.
- Any agency who received prior funding from Christ Church Outreach Commission should supply a 3rd quarter report of activities, spending, etc.

Our relationship with agencies, both in financial and human support, is important to the mission of Christ Church. However, we ask that you please keep in mind that new Outreach Commission initiatives and the evolving economic environment may require us to make changes to past grant award amounts and/or recipients. - Sapling: a program that may have a few cycles under its belt; has been able to assess how it has engaged in its community and adjust its methods to better serve it; known in its specific community for the work it does; funding is regular but a broader and deeper set of sources would be welcomed; some full time staff; appreciates guidance on how to 'take it to the next level'
- Deeper Roots: a program that has a solid rhythm in the management of its day to day work and delivery of services; shown some ability to scale its operations; well established presence in its immediate and broader communities; still seeking additional funding to expand its ability to execute on its mission; some ability to explore expanding its scope to adjacent areas; professionalized full time staff
- Full Canopy: a large program that has longstanding and vital ties in the community it serves and the city at large; continually working to optimize delivery of its services; may be able to support its own seedlings within its structure; substantial fundraising and funding capabilities; highly professionalized staff with specific experience in certain areas of organization management
